During the course of the evening Mr. Hogen was presented with a copy of "Naval Postmarks" on behalf of Mr. Tranmer, the result of winning our December quiz contest.

Report by the Chairman on the March meeting.

The first of the evenings two displays was the work of Mr. Marburg when we were given the opportunity of seeing a wide range of stamps and covers from his collection. Mr. Marburg has only again taken up collecting Austria in the last two years and as we all have seen he has devoted a lot of work to his hobby, we congratulate and thank him for a very interesting display.

Following a short break we welcomed back our President Mr. Tranmer from his holiday in Austria and were entertained by him for our second display. This consisted of a collection of covers, the centre of attraction being his prized cover written by one of the pilots concerned with the mail flown at the Pryemysl siege, and being a pioneer air mail cover. Also on display were various naval covers with photographs of the ships concerned.

**"Austrian Post Offices Abroad"**

The First two volumes of this work are scheduled to be published ca. July, 1962, @ 30/- each.

Part I : AUSTRIAN LLOYD: HISTORY, Postal History, Adriatic lines, Lines to Egypt, Mediterranean lines.  
(80 pages, 135 illustrations of cancellations, plus 5 full pages of half-tone illustrations, & 1 map).

Part II : AUSTRIAN LLOYD. Black Sea Lines, All Lines (1888-1914) (80 pages, 155 illustrations of cancellations, plus 3 full pages of half-tone illustrations).

Visit to Graz.

During my recent holiday in Austria I spent two days with Gustav Schlesinger & other fellow Austrian specialists in Graz. Among the collections of note which I saw was early Austria 1850 of T. Klammbauer & Graz local Post of H. Himmel. Mr Klammbauer filled a whole afternoon for me with the 1850 issue, in particular 9kr plates and type settings. I was most interested to see his classification of the broken corner variety of the 1850-9kr. Plate 1. Type.1. in 4 positions A.B.C.D. Each showing the progressive weakness of the plate. It was rather a lot to take up in such a short time, & I could only examine part of this extensive collection. Mr Klammbauer also showed me some examples of the Reichstags Postant in Wien, 22. Nov. 1848. This is an interesting postmark not generally known to collectors of pre-philatelic covers in this country. And originates from the time of the rising in Austria. serious students of the period may be able to exchange some duplicate items if they contact Mr. T. Klammbauer at 47 Sshonbrunnsgasse. Graz. If I tell you that we sat up until 4.a.m. the next morning looking through the joint collections of Klammbauer & Heinrich Himmel you will excuse me if my mind is somewhat hazy as to all that I saw. Mr. Himmel is an expert on the Graz local post (Pre-1850) this is a remarkable collection of these pre-philatelic covers & postmarks. There are even the original proclamations issued when the service first opened, & the whole collection is dressed with pictures & prints of Graz at the time, showing the Post Offices, & Coach stations. Although it was my intention to visit Austria to ski, I must confess I enjoyed the opportunity to meet Gustav Schlesinger & other collectors in Graz.

Visit to Graz Continued.

Short as the visit was I feel sure that the exchange of views and interests did much to encourage understanding between us all. I trust that in time more serious students of Austrian philately will make the effort to visit fellow collectors outside their immediate circle and widen still further the links which we few have created.

Addendum No 3 for Giblin.J.F.  
"The People on Austrian Stamps"  
Dionysus or Liber or Bacchus.

Dionysus, the lame god of wine, was born, according to greek legend, at Thebes in Boeotia. He was the son of Zeus, the father of the gods, and of Semele, the daughter of Cadmus King of Thebes and of Queen Harmonia. Semele was killed by the lightning of Zeus, when she demanded to see him in his divine majesty, but the child was saved and reared by the nymphs of Heliconian Mount Nysa. It was whilst he was living on Mount Nysa that Dionysus discovered how to produce wine and, when he was fully grown up, he journeyed throughout the known world, through Egypt and Persia to India, spreading the knowledge of the cultivation of the vine, and of the pleasures of wine, wherever he went. Those who resisted him and refused the gift of wine were punished terribly and the many myths associated with his name reflect the resistance of the more sober religions to the dissolute worship of Dionysus. Upon his return from India he turned into dolphins the Tyrrhenian pirates who tried to take him captive and sailed on to Naxos where he had instructed Theseus to abandon Ariadne (q.v.) Dionysus and Ariadne were married at Naxos and the scene after that marriage is depicted on this stamp as shown on the large painting ; "The Triumph of Ariadne" which was painted by Hans Makart (q.v.) in 1873 and which now hangs in the Austrian Gallery of the Upper Belvedere. Thus, having spread his cult around the world, Dionysus entered Olympus as one of the twelve great gods. Indeed not only was his wife, Ariadne, given divine honours but he obtained the release of his mother, Semele, from the Kingdom of the Dead and introduced her also into Olympus under the name of Thyone. The Greek myths concerning Dionysus have been summarised by R. Graves in "The Greek Myths" 27 and interpreted in the light of modern knowledge of the nature of the legends. (Ref.5. Since his suggestion to introduce a postal card in Germany was rejected, the actual birth of our postal card occurred in 1869 in Austria. Three years after Stephan's proposition was made, there appeared an article in the Vienna "Neue Freie Presse" on January 26th, 1869, written by a professor of Economics, Dr. Emanuel Herrmann, under the title "About a Novel way of Correspondence by Mail". In this article, Herrmann suggested the use of cards, which he called already "Postcards" and which could be mailed at a reduced rate of 2 kreuzer, if the message, the signature and address did not count more than 20 words. Emanuel Herrmann found more understanding for his idea from the Austrian postal authorities. The Austrian Postmaster General at that time, Maly von Povanovite (or Vevanovits according to another version) saw to it that Dr. Herrmann's suggestion became reality within a surprisingly short time (8 months), despite the well known red tape that flourished in the old Monarchy. Incidentally Dr. Herrmann's suggestion to restrict the contents of a postcard to 20 words was rightfully rejected. Thus, on October 1st, 1869, Austria was the first country in the world to introduce the postal card under the name of "Correspondence Card". The success of the new invention was instantaneous and the little postcard at once became so popular, that during the first three months of its existence, nearly three million cards were sold, a figure that greatly increased in the following years. The size of the first postal cards was somewhat smaller than that of later issues, about 122 x 85 mm. The front shows the wording "Correspondenz Karte" arched above the double eagle emblem and is framed by an ornamental border, inside of which there is a second frame, consisting of alternating dots and diamonds, the sequence of which offered an endless variety of permutations which will be discussed later. The first cards also show the words "An" (meaning "To") and "in" (meaning in city, in town), with the usual dotted lines for the address.

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I have received from Dr.L.Howe. of 117,Market Street,Clearfield,PA.U.S.A. a copy of the American Philatelist (No5/1962) covering his study of the Bosnia issues of 1906. This combines the work of E.C.Coleman and other leading American Philatelists in this field, those of you who followed the sheet construction studies in this bulletin will know most of the facts.

The outcome of 25 years research is now published in the American Philatelist (Price 75c) and lists not only the perforation combinations but also illustrates many of the rarer combinations and a sheet of the 5 Krone value.
